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141 Days and Counting..... 2012 Area 11 Festival/Conference June 21 – 24 in Salt Lake City, Utah

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Yes, that's right – don't be a PROCRASTINATOR!! The Area 11 Festival is only 141 days away!! Have YOU mailed in your registration form? Did you know that you can save \$100 by registering before March 1<sup>st</sup>? The Polished Bronze Ringing Track is limited to 30 ringers on a first come, first served basis!! Other classes may also be limited due to meeting space considerations. So, don't delay – mail in your registration today. You can make a \$200 deposit now and pay in full by May 15, 2012. A word to Directors – don't wait to share information about the Festival with your bell choirs. And don't keep it to yourself. Encourage your ringers to take this opportunity to become a better ringer!!

There are three other exciting Area 11 events in the next couple of months that you won't want to miss. The Northern Colorado Festival will be held in Loveland, Colorado on Saturday, March 10<sup>th</sup>. Paul Gentry will be their clinician. The Utah Spring Ring will also be held on March 10<sup>th</sup> in Riverton, Utah. Kevin McChesney will be their guest clinician. Casper, Wyoming will be the site of the Wyoming Spring Ring on April 20-21 and the clinician will be Monica McGowan. These events, like all Area 11 events are open to all Handbell Musicians of America.

heard us play and I explained what we would be doing in the Festival. I asked her to incorporate handbells with Utah themes. You will notice the handbell takes on the shape of a beehive. Utah is nicknamed the "Beehive State" which might seem strange for a state that is much better known for its beautiful sandstone arches then its ability to mass produce honey. When the early pioneers ventured out to Utah for the first time they had little to work with. As a result they had to produce their own supplies. This effort of mass producing what they needed became the inspiration for creating both the state motto of "industry" and the state symbol of "the beehive". It is also what the beehive inside the Utah state flag stands for. The beehive was officially adopted in 1848 to become the state symbol. It is so appropriate that we use the "BEE" to promote our 2012 Festival. Our primary focus this festival is to "work hard" so everyone returns home a better ringer, a better director, a better composer, a better HANDBELL MUSICIAN!! The flower on the logo pin is a sego lily, the state flower. Between 1840 and 1851 food became very scarce in Utah due to a crop-devouring plague of crickets. Families were put on rations, and during this time they learned to dig for and to eat the soft, bulbous root of the sego lily. The beautiful sego lily has white, lilac, or yellow flowers and grows six to eight inches high on open grass and sage rangelands in the Great Basin during the summer months.

The blue at the bottom of the pin is the Great Salt Lake. And the sandstone colored mountains surround it all. This is also the first time we have a logo pin inscribed with our new name, HANDBELL MUSI-CIANS OF AMERICA!!

After Cara completed her artwork, we took it to Symbol Arts, the Utah Company that designed and produced all of the pins for the 2002 Winter Olympics!! This month Utah is celebrating the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of those Olympics.

How do you get one of these beautiful one of a kind logo pins? You have to attend the 2012 Area 11 Festival Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah June 21 - 24!!! So, BEEeeeee There!!!

# Ensemble Ringing Track in SALT LAKE CITY!! by Michael Kastner

This note is to address the *inner bell-hog* within each and every advanced handbell musician. "Bell hog" is **not really** the term I would apply to most handbell players who wish to extend their abilities and experiences. Many of us have a sincere desire to extend our handbell experiences

beyond the artificial walls of our own assignment in our own choir. Handbell ringing is a soulful and physical art. Ensemble ringing extends the soul and connects you to your fellow musicians in a way no other musical activity can and is even more physically engaging - not to mention just plain fun!!

Most bell festival events offer some kind of solo or ensemble ringing "class" which is simply a taste-spoon. You leave these events with much homework required to get the techniques down and be able to say you are competent, even in the fledgling sense. The Handbell Musicians of America Area 11 Festival in Salt Lake City, this coming June, offers **an entire track** in ensemble ringing. This means you will be training and practicing in lieu of massed ringing. This means you will hone your skill set (be it newly learned skills or long-time techniques with new emphasis on musicianship) real-time (no homework - you'll return from this event a better ensemble musician!!).

The hard part is done for you!! Bell sets, tables, pads, and music are not an issue. The logistics of setup and equipment often stymies fledgling ensemble ringers (and is even a pain for experienced ensembles). At the Salt Lake City event, you will be in a first-class environment with **all equipment and music included.** Clinician Michael Kastner will bring his expertise and experience of having run five international solo/ensemble events and empower you to learn as fast or as methodically as you like. A performance opportunity is available for ensembles wishing to strut their stuff (not required - but certainly encouraged if you are even thinking about it). If you attend as a complete (or partial) ensemble, you can shape your experience as a 3-day long coaching session. If you attend unattached to a particular ensemble, you can still get the experience of working together with other like-minded musicians in a supportive environment. (And before you ask, of COURSE you can bring your own bells or equipment - even music - if you prefer!!).

**No massed ringing for ensemble track participants.** This means you will be able to learn more extended techniques and have time to fine-tune them, with real-time coaching. This means you can focus on extended forms of ensemble ringing such as musical nuances, movement, presentation skills, and memory tricks which take a simply fun or novel presentation over the threshold to become a true art form. Dedicated rooms, bell sets, music, keyboard, and support musicians are available to you for a further, simply heavenly ensemble experience.

Why the hard-sell? Sometimes ringers who are "thinking about it" need the gentle nudge to try it out. This opportunity is so rare, I would venture to say no other Area event has offered such an experience. It is so easy for you to take your first step into the world of ensemble ringing at this event, I can't help but encourage you to look at this as a once-in-a-lifetime experience. If you are already a well-tuned ensemble and want to participate in what will amount to a 3-day coaching session for your group, again, there is no other place to get this experience - period. There is certainly a strength in numbers effect that cannot be ignored either. There can only be an offering such as this at an Area event if there is sufficient interest and participation to support the structure necessary for such an experience. If you show Area 11 that ensemble ringing is alive and well and you or your group is outstanding and looking to become even better, then the Area 11 leadership will surely address this by planning more similar events.

The easy part is left for you. All you have to do to is sign up. The hard parts will happen behind the scene. You will enjoy the entire event, including ANOTHER once-in-a-lifetime experience with the Bells on Temple Square concert - every bit worth the effort - and this is, after all, the easy part. Make the time investment in yourself. Make the commitment to come with high energy and expectations and return from Salt Lake City a better, more confident and stellar handbell artist. And while we're at it, return with a new label - instead of "bell hog" expect to wear the moniker "ensemble musician."

# Dr. Michael Mazzatenta wins again!

Former Area 11 chair, Dr. Michael Mazzatenta, continues to win handbell composition contests. While all of his former wins have been for AGEHR (now Handbell Musicians of America) Area composition contests, his most recent win is for a contest sponsored by Bells of the Sound, a Community Choir in the Seattle, WA. area. When asked what inspires him to enter these contests, he says it is the themes as well as the guidelines provided in the contest descriptions.

Dr. Mazzatenta is employed as an organist, accompanist, and handbell director at La Casa de Cristo Lutheran Church in Scottsdale AZ but this latest contest theme, "All That Jazz", was a perfect fit for him because of the other "world" of music he lives in - Jazz! (He is also adjunct instructor of Class Piano and Jazz Combo at Chandler-Gilbert Community College in Chandler, AZ)

His winning composition is "*The Glad Sound Blues*" and it will be performed at the Spring Concerts of Bells of the Sound. Bells of the Sound say this about the piece, "Right from the pickup, "*The Glad Sound Blues*" swings! This extremely well-crafted jazz blues has great contrasts and a laid-back style, and everyone gets a chance to play a variety of techniques. We expect this one to be a crowd favorite." For Mazz this was his third try at winning one of the Bells of the Sound composition contests.
