Area 11 Members Share Their Experiences at ELEVATIONS!

Taking Pride in Showmanship, by Becky Owen (Midvale, Utah)

I loved a lot of things about the recent Area 11 Bell Festival in Loveland, CO, but one of the things that stands out to me was Debbie Rice's attention to showmanship. In each piece she added things here and there to give new sounds or effects to highlight the pieces or ringers in different ways.

The first piece of our final concert was a mass ring piece, *Festival Bell Flourish*. Debbie added in echoes, but instead of a regular echo brushed lightly on the table, she had us "air pump" the echo in unison. She also added in overhead tower swings at the end of the piece. So she took two techniques that many of us were familiar with already and pretty much turned them upside down. Not only did that produce a unique sound, but added to the visual effect for our audience.

The Copper-lite to Copper choir played two pieces, *You Raise Me Up* and *Festivo*. To bring their bells up to a ready position for *You Raise Me Up*, they brought them up in succession along the choir, so it looked like a wave of bells appearing. *Festivo* included a percussion section, and I believe that Debbie extended that part and really got creative with different drumming techniques. Instead of just mallet clicks, they added drumming on the pads and different parts of the choir creating different rhythms. It was a really fun piece to watch and hear.



The Copper to Bronze choir played three pieces, *Light of Peace*, *Allegro con moto*, and *Easter*. At the beginning of *Light of Peace*, only one row of the choir was standing and ringing. Then each row added one by one until all four rows of the choir were participating. It created a really interesting effect to have the choir build and build like that. At the end of *Easter*, the entire choir turned around in unison as they held the last note, so they were no longer facing the director, and then dampened all at once. That was really impressive to see such a large choir be in total unison for the cut off with no cue from Debbie.

The Polished Bronze choir also played three pieces, *La Paix*; *Savior of the Nation*, *Come*; and *Festival Sanctus*. *Savior of the Nation*, *Come* had a beautiful Gregorian chant at the beginning and end of the song that Debbie had us play on chimes to really bring it out. She also had the high trebles play the melody of O Come, O Come Emmanuel that was imbedded into the piece on chimes to help it stand out as well. We ended the song by shimmering our bells down in unison. *Festival Sanctus* was a fast paced song that Debbie had us start ringing right off the table, which added to fast paced feeling of the song.



We ended the concert with one more mass ring piece, *Celebrate with Ringing*. There were a lot of accents in the song, and Debbie had us punch the accents rather than ringing through on them. This gave them a different sound, since the sound didn't carry through like a regular ring, and made the accent more pronounced. At both the beginning and the end of the piece, Debbie had us ring higher and higher to help increase the dynamic level. We started ringing at about chin level, then moved up to cheek level, and then moved up again to forehead level, which made the build up not only audible but visual for our audience.

I really enjoyed the attention that Debbie gave to these details. With the amount of time we had to practice, it would have been very easy to just focus on learning the notes and dynamics and call it a day. But she didn't, she moved us past that, and hopefully it helped us become better ringers, because we were now paying more close attention to how we were ringing physically, and what that meant for the audience. These details added not only to how I personally rang, but also deepened my understanding of the pieces and the feelings and emotions they were meant to convey. She highlighted us as ringers and the gorgeous pieces we played, all with a little showmanship.

Attending the Area 11 Festival as a Brand New Ringer! by Bob Davies (Phoenix, Arizona)

Here is a bit about my experience at Elevations. This was my first experience playing handbells. My interest in participating and attending the Area 11 Workshop started from an inquiry from my wife, Teri, when she asked me if I wanted to sign up and learn. I have been hinting to her for some time now that I wish I could enjoy music even a fraction as much as she does, as she is an accomplished handbell enthusiast. She suggested if I was interested I could prep a little in the upcoming weeks prior to the meeting. I decided this would be a great opportunity for me to experience handbells, hands on. Plus, any excuse to get out of Phoenix in this heat to a cooler climate for a few days is a good one. I had a naive appreciation for what I was signing up for.



To provide you a snapshot of my musical background, I didn't have any. I had taken a couple guitar and organ lessons, 50 plus years go. That is it. My experience with handbells was in attending handbell choir concerts occasionally and being a roadie helping to set up for a concert occasionally. I knew the music could be mesmerizing. It was hinted to me that in preparation for the Area 11 Workshop, I needed to know fundamentals of reading music. I quickly was challenged in learning this new language, music. I was placed in the Copper Lite section and placed in the front row playing the C and D bells. Here I stood for the remainder of the weekend, staring at the Conductor, trying to appear more than a deer in headlights. As it turned out, Ms. Rice was much more than a hunter looking to fell weak prey, she was an inspirational team builder.

As the weekend went on I found myself practicing my pieces in my room, and in the hallway on breaks and before and after practices. I fortunately, was placed next to a Director, Joyce, who was very helpful and kept reminding me to count to stay on track. In between practices I attended a couple hours of music theory, battling bass bells, and the anxiety of playing bells and stretching classes. My wife and I even did the speed dating event, she finished 2nd place.

Long story short, I made it through the live performance without passing out. A friend of ours videoed 1 piece and I actually looked like I was really into it. I believe I have really grown through this experience and it has been positive for me. There were moments early on when I felt like I didn't belong there. Through some hard work, a lot of practice, an immense amount of encouragement from many participants, I have survived my first handbell workshop. Only a few new grey hairs! I made many new acquaintances. I would like to thank all for encouragement and especially my lovely wife, Teri, who knows my discomfort and shined me on at every corner. As a result of this experience I am considering joining a beginners church choir in the fall. I have been told the music they play in the church choir will be straight forward compared what we accomplished at Elevations.


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
Ringing in the Atrium


