Classes and Workshops are important elements of "Elevations!!!" – the 2014 Area 11 Festival/Conference at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Loveland, Colorado. Attendees will experience technique sessions in all types of ringing – treble bells, bass bells, battery bells, and chimes. There will be opportunities to ring – both in the "Ringing Up!" tracks and in reading sessions. Reading sessions for all levels and seasons and 'chimes only' are included in the "Elevations!!!" schedule. Are you ready for something new? Attend a World Drumming class; create a processional; set up and ring using bell trees; learn some tips (share some tips?) for rehearsal preparation and score study. What about working with youth, basic music reading, and ringer health and performance anxiety? Whether you are ringer, a director, a fan of handbells or ALL THREE - there's a class or workshop for you at "Elevations!!!"

Remember, Late Registration begins with registrations post-marked March 2, 2014. Save \$100 and register no later than March 1st!

SHORT CLASS DESCRIPTIONS: Subject to change –

Note: Full Class Descriptions/Goal available after April 15.

Ringing Up! Tracks: Return home a better handbell musician – 'ringing up' to the next level.

Technique classes and workshops for ALL bells and chimes: A workshop setting with lots of hands-on practice to hone the various skills that create handbell musicians.

Equipment Maintenance: An introduction and review workshop highlighting the best practices for handbell and handchime maintenance.

World Drumming: Enjoy the different sounds of various world instruments. Learn ensemble rhythms, drumming techniques, and how to include them in concert and with the congregation.

Bell Trees and Processionals: Less than a full choir? Want to feature a melody line or descant? Create a processional.

Rehearsal Preparation and Score Study: How best to prepare for rehearsals – both from a Director's and the ringers perspective.

Working with Youth: Start an ensemble - how to keep 'em busy - resources review - idea sharing.

Basic Music Reading: And introduction to basic music reading - lines and spaces - the grand staff - dynamic markings.

Ringer Health and Performance Anxiety: Diet? Eat and drink to be energized for rehearsals and concerts. Got nerves? 'Get ready' for the performance.

Creative Assignments: Through score study and analysis, discover the tips and tricks in the mystery and mastery of assigning handbells.

More than Just a Reading Session: Throughout the Years – Celebrating 60 Years of The Guild reviewing repertoire and techniques.

Keep the Rhythm Going! By Marilyn Lake

Let's change the way we make music - the way we ring bells - the way we experience worship -the way we feel music. The classes that will be offered at the Area 11 Festival in June will encompass all facets of bell ringing as well as adding in other members of the percussion family. Drumming and experiencing world rhythms can become almost hypnotic, cathartic even.

Percussion instruments are those that can be struck, scraped or shaken. Handbells must be the queen then, since most of the other instruments in this category produce a sound in only one fashion, and bells can do all three! We will explore the possible sounds from tubanos and djembes as well as from water bottles and buckets. Put your music down and feel the beat...internalize the rhythm...lock into the ensemble sound.



One goal is to put together a World Drumming Worship experience for our Festival participants, giving everyone ideas of how they can share this unique experience with their congregations. We will discover activities that you can incorporate in your VBS programs, or in your classroom.

As a music educator I try to keep all of the kids in my classroom busy with making music independently...that means that I layer a lot of different rhythms and timbres to make a "groove". Don't we do that in every handbell rehearsal as well? As bell ringers we are called upon to be independent music makers, holding to the tempo, reading our music, counting, affecting different dynamics and techniques. Come enjoy the rhythm of the drums, and chimes, and bells, and anything else we can find to shake, scrape or beat upon!

All frustrated drummers welcomed!!!

This month's new FAQs for the Area 11 Festival/Conference ELEVATIONS!

Question: I will be flying in to the Denver International Airport. What transportation options do I have to get to the Embassy Suites in Loveland?

Answer: The hotel is 49 miles, or about 50 minutes driving time from the airport. The hotel website lists the following options for transportation: bus service, limousine, Super Shuttle, rental car, or taxi. You might want to contact the hotel for more information about options available. The Area 11 Board has used the services of Super Shuttle and we were satisfied with the service.

Question: My roommate and I plan to arrive on Wednesday – one day before the Festival starts. We plan to leave the Denver area on Monday – so we will need an extra night on Sunday. Are rooms available and what are the charges?

Answer: Yes, a limited number of rooms are available before and after the Festival. Be sure to include your request for the extra room-nights on your Registration forms. Add one of the following amounts to your total registration fee.

For Registrations postmarked no later than March 1st – Double Occupancy = \$71 per person/per night Triple Occupancy = \$55 per person/per night

For Registrations postmarked March 2nd and later – Double Occupancy = \$85 per person/per night Triple Occupancy = \$64 per person/per night


Area 11 has seven sets of handchimes that are loaned to teachers and/or church musicians during each school year as a way to introduce handchime playing to children within Area 11. During this past year, some wonderful things have been happening in the schools that have been using chimes loaned to them through this program.

Kris Barber, a teacher at Sunrise Ridge Intermediate School in St. George, Utah has used her set of chimes with her choir class and even performed during two of their choir concerts this year. She has also used them with her enrichment class called Chime Time. "We have had lots of fun with the chimes. The Chime Time class had about 20 students who met 12 times over a four-week period. We are beginning a new class next week that will have about 30 students who will also meet for about 12 class times. I have managed to raise the necessary funds to purchase a 37-tone set of chimes and have ordered them from Malmark. I am very excited about the imminent arrival of my very own chimes and plan to use them as often as possible. Thank you so much for this opportunity! We have loved the chimes."

Gayle Workman, a teacher at Tonaquint Intermediate School in St. George, Utah has been using their set of chimes to embellish their choral music. "Christmas was a great time to use them. We will also be using them for our Southern Utah Performing Arts Festival song called "Homeward Bound" where the sound of bells are needed." She also uses them in conjunction with her lesson on pitch and notation. The students write their own 4 measure songs and then perform them in small groups with instruments. Each student has a part in choosing which notes, dynamics, title, and tempo are used. "Thank you for the opportunity of using them. They are so beautiful!"

Edie Phelps, a teacher at Enterprize Elementary School in Enterprize, Utah has been using the chimes with the 3rd grade classes. "The children have really enjoyed using them, and it has taken my rowdiest age and made them more focused. I have loved that we performed with them in the Christmas concert and the teachers, student body and parents were all enthralled with them. We are planning on using them again in our Spring concert. Thank you for this opportunity to expose my students to an aspect of music that they would otherwise not have had the chance to experience. Thank you again."
