Why Go to Festival?

I began my handbell career in November, 1973 with two octaves and eight kids from 6th through 10th grades. One of the first things we did was decide on a name. The kids chose "MOO Ringers", since we were at Mt. of Olives Lutheran Church in Phoenix, Arizona. I did not like this at first, but it grew on me, and was certainly recognizable.

Another thing I did after receiving the bells was to join the Guild. Being a total novice, I needed all the help I could get! I received information about the Area 11 Festival held that summer in Estes Park, CO at the YMCA Camp. Offered were classes, concerts and fellowship, all of which I had experienced in other organizations, so I already knew the value of this kind of event. We all saved our money and planned on going. Unfortunately, I began a new job and was not able to go at the last minute. I found another director who wanted to go, but whose choir couldn't, so I sent my choir with her.

The night of the Final Massed Concert, my choir called me on a pay phone and talked for 45 minutes! Each one had to excitedly share their story with me while others had to go change money into quarters for the phone. Needless to say, my kids were absolutely blown away by this festival! Indeed, this was a life-changing event for several of my kids! I only wish I could have gone to learn more about this instrument that had so intrigued my ringers and I.

The following year, 1975, I received information about a National Festival in Logan, UT – the closest site to Arizona. We only had two octaves and the kids were torn between spending the money we saved for a third octave or go to the festival. As it turned out, we were able to do both, and I was able to go also.

That Festival was truly life-changing for me – in many respects. I had my first bout with food poisoning, and spent 2 days pretty much in bed. But the classes were excellent and the Final Concert was awesome. What a sound! 1200 ringers all ringing the same thing under one of the best conductors we have ever had, Donald E. Allured. He was wearing white tails, and on the final chord of *Feestdag*, he looked like Moses parting the Red Sea, and had absolute command of all 1200 ringers! I remember thinking to myself, "when I grow up, I want to be just like him!" Unbelievable!!!

We travelled by bus to that festival with the Bells of the Twisted Cross from Tucson, AZ's Casa Adobes Congregational Church, directed by Lynn Hauck. On the way back, we spent the night in Kanab, UT, and sitting by the pool watching our two choirs, who got along great, Lynn shared that she would like to take her choir in two years to her reunion at Mt. Holyoke College, and then to the Eastern National Festival at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. Someone said, "What if . . ." so we decided to think about taking our two choirs on a national tour to this Festival in 1977, which gave us two years to plan and raise money.

We accomplished that goal and took 26 people on a 48 passenger bus as the *Grand Canyon State Ringers* from Tucson through Phoenix, ringing a concert at each of our churches, then performed 26 concerts in 28 days touring across the country to Washington D.C., NJ, NY, MA, NH, VT, and back to Arizona. What an incredible trip this was for all of us. A lot of us still keep in touch with each other, even after all these years. Both choirs continued to see each other at State, Area 11 and National Festivals in the many years following our tour. To our knowledge, this is the first time two choirs from two churches over 100 miles away joined forces for a tour of this magnitude. This happened as a direct result of the 1975 National Festival in Logan, UT.

That's what festivals do – they truly bring your choir into a oneness with each other, allows your choir to gain confidence individually and collectively, expands musicianship and builds a desire to be "the best that we can be" individually and as a group. This happens through the knowledge gained in classes and workshops, critically observing other groups (how they look when they ring, new techniques, new music, etc.), and the incredible fellowship the ringers have with each other and ringers from other choirs, other parts of the country, and, perhaps, other parts of the world. A hand-bell festival is indeed a very unique event that every handbell ringer should experience. For first time attendees, this is an event that, at least, will be an eye-opening experience if not a life-changing experience for them. And, like handbells themselves, it is just plain fun!

Take your ringers to a festival. It is the best thing you can do for them personally, musically and socially! Turn it into a vacation, or combine it with a mission trip, or make it just bells. It is always a win-win experience for everyone. So, when you come to the Area 11 Festival this summer, look us up: The Canyon Carillon, Gold Canyon United Methodist Church, Gold Canyon, Arizona. I look forward to meeting you for the first time or seeing you again!




Area 11 Members Tuned Up Their Playing at Fall Events



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Feature From the Area 11 Board

AN AMAZING SOUND

Remember the first time you heard a handbell group perform? As each of us thinks about our initial reaction to the sound of handbells or chimes, the delight and fascination we remember is uniquely personal and special. Perhaps it was the joy of hearing a favorite Christmas tune interpreted through a new medium. Perhaps you were in awe of the variety of different sounds that can be produced using just two basic instruments. No matter what music or which group performed, there was something about that experience that drew you to handbells and changed your life forever.

After that initial experience, many of us joined a handbell group as a ringer. At first we weren't sure we could get the bells to ring, much less make music. As time passed we honed our skills in various areas

such as the correct way to ring and damp, mallet techniques, weaving, four-in-hand, and chimes. We learned from a variety of sources including fellow ringers, group read and ring sessions, and area events led by clinicians. We performed during our church services and some even joined community groups where they had the opportunity to perform in bell concerts both locally and on tour.

As a result of accumulated bell knowledge and experience, many new concerns surface which affect not only individual ringers, but also the bell choir and even the Guild. How do we arrange the bells so they can be shared between ringers and enable four-in-hand techniques? Is our presentation good with smiling ringers and uniform motion on certain notes? How can we get members to help out with all that needs to be done both before and after a performance? How can we encourage ringers to attend events and support the Guild as well as our various groups?

The hidden danger is that our concerns can lead to a mental and physical fatigue which derails us from our primary purpose of creating joy and amazement for the audience. We find ourselves banging a piece out in 2 minutes and 30 seconds for the offertory without ever considering how it might enrich the worship service. A community group strives to play ever faster and more technically challenging pieces as a badge of honor without considering whether the audience would also like a few simple pieces performed well or a slow piece with breathtaking chords and voicing. Deep down we all know things aren't quite right when the director is yelling "Smile like you're enjoying this!" In short, we've become much better ringers, but we're not producing music with feeling or having fun playing.

My challenge to each of us as the holiday season approaches and our concert schedules get busy is to recapture the magic that attracted us to bells in the first place. Take some time to reflect on each piece of music even if you've played or directed it a hundred times before. Slow down a little between those harried events and take time to enjoy the company of your fellow musicians. Look out and connect with the audience as you share not only your technical skills, but also your love of bells and the music being performed. Rediscover the childlike excitement and joy of hearing ringing handbells which create an amazing sound.
