

Young Ringers Camp 2015

JUST IMAGINE...

39 young people, ages 10 to 22 from six different cities from all around Area 11 coming together for 4 days to work with 2 of the most outstanding clinicians in the handbell world in a beautiful, picturesque setting located in the mountains of Colorado....

No, it wasn't a dream! It was a reality and it all happened at Area 11's Young Ringers Camp held last June at Snow Mountain Ranch! Marilyn Lake and Bonnie Tranby were our clinicians, and with just a few short rehearsals, our youth ringers each had the opportunity to learn and perform 4 pieces in a concert setting. When not in rehearsals, they attended workshops. Marilyn focused on rhythm with World Drumming sessions and Maori Stick Games from the ancient tribes of New Zealand, while Bonnie worked on executing different bell techniques properly, having fun with the Bronze Family Feud and playing processionals. Bonnie challenged the ringers to reflect on their camp experience and write a story about one of their pieces. Camp wasn't all about ringing, but also adventure! They participated in the Summer Tubing Hill, a brand new attraction at Snow Mountain. The Challenge Course allowed them to work on skills of cooperation and teamwork, skills that we use as we ring bells together.

We appreciated having our nine chaperones that made sure we got to camp safely, and were always ready to assist whenever needed. We want to thank those who loaned us their bells, chimes and other equipment – Joan Swim, Anne Kleve, Karen Meersman, and Jeannine Holt. THANK YOU!!

- So, what did the young ringers have to say about camp?
 - I have really enjoyed this bell camp. Getting to know people has been really fun. I really like the songs we are playing, a good mix of hard and easy, exciting and beautiful.
 - I learned how to ring two notes I have not rung before! I learned how to work together and trust people I did not know in one of the team building games we played. I learned new ways to ring bells.
 - My first bell camp was a blast. I met some great people and learned some pretty music. Who knew I'd be able to sight read so fast! The camp itself was super cool. There are so many things to do. It's been a great experience!
 - One thing I have really loved and enjoyed at bell camp is all the friends you make. Another thing I really like are the directors. I also love the songs they are so much fun. One thing I didn't like was how fast it went by. I wish there were more days!
 - It was awesome! I learned so much and can't wait to come back.

2015 Pinnacle in Dallas, Texas

This past July, some of our Area 11 members attended Pinnacle, a National event held in Dallas, Texas.

It was a wonderful experience for each of them!

A few of those attending were attending as first-timers at their first National event.

Marcia and Katie were two of those first-time attendees and have shared their thoughts and experiences with us this month.

How exciting! I was going to my first national handbell conference – Pinnacle 2015! For several years, the announcements of various national HMA events had made me think about attending. Due to my life situations, I had not been able to go to any of them. Now, however, I am living by myself in a new location and am free to do whatever I want to do!

The announcements for Pinnacle were enticing to me because I am ringing in two community handbell groups and a church handbell choir in the Denver metro area. It seemed that the various classes offered would be a great learning experience for me as well as give me valuable information to bring back to the church handbell choir which had recently restarted. This church had a 4-1/2 octave set of handbells that had sat unused for 26 years. Two years ago the music director and I worked to restart the handbell choir and we now have 12 enthusiastic people who want to ring.

Of course going to Pinnacle on my own was a little scary – I didn't know anyone else from Denver who might be going. It was lucky for me that I had met Sue Hahn at an earlier Area 11 workshop and contacted her prior to the event. We exchanged telephone numbers and agreed to meet for lunch. This, of course, made me feel a lot better as knowing Sue helped me meet other ringers in Colorado and the other states in Area 11.

But, I shouldn't have been concerned. After registering at the hotel, I sat and watched as hundreds of happy handbell people of all ages came into the lobby. Meeting Ellie Hodder at the event registration desk the next morning was a highlight for me. She was very helpful, answering my many questions about the conference, classes, and concerts in her most cheerful and friendly manner. Some of the things I learned were not available to me in any printed material I had previously read. The concerts and showcases were wonderful! There was such diversity in the ensembles, trio, solo ringers, and large handbell groups that performed for us – more than I would have seen if I attended a dozen separate concerts! Lastly, the hotel accommodations were outstanding. It was great fun to have dinner with different groups of people each evening in the hotel restaurants. One evening, a special bus was provided to take a group of us to town for dinner in a Grapevine, TX, Mexican restaurant. Such fun to laugh and eat with other handbell enthusiasts!

Would I do this again? Absolutely! I can't wait for the opportunity to go to the next regional or national event!


2015 Pinnacle in Dallas, Texas
