

Beginnings...

One aspect of ringing programs I have focused on in recent years is beginnings. We have done our best to find ways to tap into the freshness and excitement of the new year by taking advantage of these special times. It doesn't matter if it's the beginning of the school year, the beginning of the calendar year, the beginning of a new bell choir or some combination of all three. I have found it helpful and beneficial to schedule time for youth bell ringers around beginnings. These are great times to get new music in front of ringers, get them thinking about bells, and give youth time for fellowship and fun.



Beginnings are times to celebrate past successes, reflect on areas of improvement, and to dream about possibilities of what's ahead. I have found youth ringers to be amazingly adept at dreaming big and finding ways into those dreams by setting up smaller landmark goals along the way. We have found it most helpful to find common ground in shared dreams that have one foot on the ground and foot on the stars. Here are five jumping off places to get you started in your own beginnings

Repertoire, Repertoire, Repertoire: Choose great music your youth will love, can ring well, and will challenge them to grow in their skills. Get it in their hands early and in their hands often.

Raise the Roof! Find once piece your youth REALLY want to ring but is pretty close to IMPOSSIBLE (at least, for now). Keep it in their folders and pull it out when they least expect it!

Rap Sessions! Youth need to be heard. I've often found their ideas are far better than mine. Harness their quick-thinking creative juices. Let them weigh in on goals and dreams and new ways of doing things.

Approach this with an open mind and you will be amazed at what they bring to the table!

Road Trip! Get out of town: It can be to go see the Raleigh Ringers or to go ring for a retirement community or to team up with another youth bell group for a weekend event.

R & R: Make time for fellowship and fun both before, within, and after rehearsals. Let these times be "both-and"... organic and planned, free-flowing and structured, bells-skilled based and times simply set aside for connection.

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Area 11 Spring Ring Event Clinician Bios

Utah Spring Ring clinician, *Carlos E. Rivera-Aponte*, is regarded as one of Puerto Rico's foremost handbell masters, Carlos has had a fruitful career of more than twenty five years as director of various handbell programs in Puerto Rico, Venezuela, Dominican Republic and Guatemala. He completed his university studies with a degree in arts with a major in education and music at the University of Puerto Rico. He later received his master's degree in music education with an emphasis on choral music at Florida State University's College of Music in Tallahassee, Florida, where he studied with Professor Rodney Eichenberguer and Dr. André Thomas.

Carlos is a founding member of the Puerto Rican Handbell Festival served as musical director of the Vivace, Allegro and Cantabile handbell ensembles in his town of Aibonito, Puerto Rico. In addition, he is founder and creator of the handbell movement in Venezuela and founder of the handbell movement for the elderly in Puerto Rico.



He worked as a teacher and dean of studies at the San Juan Children's Choir where he directed several choral and instrumental ensembles including two handbell choirs; Campanelas and an alumni choir.

He nows teaches at the University of Puerto Rico at Carolina where he conducts two choral ensembles and at the University of Puerto Rico at Arecibo where he teaches the handbell methodology courses and conducts the university's handbell ensemble, Resonare.

Professor Rivera is a member of the American Choral Director's Association (ACDA), the Handbell Musicians of America (AGEHR), the American Orff-Schulwerck Association (AOSA), the Latin American Music Education Forum (Fladem) and the National Association for Music Education (NAfME).



Colorado Spring Ring clinician, Jason W. Krug, (b. 1978) is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana. He graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 2000 with a degree in Music. He is currently a freelance composer, arranger, clinician, and teacher.

Jason's handbell career began in 2001 when he began ringing with and arranging music for the Wagner Memorial Bell Choir at Irvington United Methodist Church, and in 2005, he took over as the choir's director. Since his first publication in 2006, he's had over 300 handbell compositions released, with more on the way. His pieces have been featured at numerous local, state, and regional festivals and workshops, both in the United States and abroad, and he has been guest clinician at handbell events from coast to coast.

In addition to his handbell compositions, he also has published works for piano, organ, choir, and string orchestra.

In his spare time, Jason enjoys writing, and has spent several years working on a young adult fantasy series, The Sadonian Chronicles. He recently released his first non-fiction book, *The General Theory of Creativity*, all about the creative process, and is hard at work on various other writing projects.

Wyoming Spring Ring clinician, *David M. Harris*, has been the director of The Raleigh Ringers since January 1990, when he was instrumental in the formation of the group. David studied music while earning a degree in computer science at the Pennsylvania State University and has received private instruction in conducting from Dr. William A. Payn of Bucknell University. David was the director of the handbell program at Hudson Memorial Presbyterian Church, and has served Handbell Musicians of America (formerly the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers - AGEHR) as North Carolina State Chairman and as Area III Treasurer. He chaired the national committee that planned the very first Community/Professional Handbell Choir event, Pinnacle 2000, which was held in Las Vegas, Nevada. David is in increasing demand as a clinician and guest conductor, and has led several national Handbell Musicians of America events as well as serving as the primary handbell clinician for denominational music events, such as those held at Montreat, Lake Junaluska and Lutheridge. After growing up in the Northeast, David moved to Raleigh with his wife, Kristina. Dave and Kris have three grown children.

Arizona Handbell Rising clinician, *Debbie Rice*, draws on her vast experience as a professional singer, choral conductor and passion for teaching to encourage standards for the handbell and handchime instrument to be musical and worshipful. She maintains a demanding travel schedule of national, international and denominational events as clinician, adjudicator and conductor.

Her international schedule has included assignments in Australia, Canada, Great Britain, Hong Kong, Israel, Japan, Singapore, and Taiwan. In May 2015 she conducted an international handbell festival tour to Estonia & Finland: Ringing Under the Northern Lights.

She has been a visiting professor at Concordia University College of Alberta, Edmonton Canada. Her primary responsibilities have been with JUBILOSO! Bells of Concordia, Concordia Ringers and Singspiration. She has been co-conductor for Concordia's Community Chorus, presented workshops and training for schools, church musicians and music educators and adjudicated handbell teams and singers.



Debbie's degrees are in music education, opera and musical theatre. She has sung with a US regional opera company, professional choir and studied early music and conducting. In 1983 she founded the handbell ministries of Becks Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, NC.

With the Handbell Musicians of America she held elected offices on the AGEHR National Board as Area Chair, National Secretary, and the National Presidential cycle. Since 2008 Debbie has served as Executive Director for the International Handbell Committee.
